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| _____ 1. Kaper Chart | A. Official awards earned by Brownie Girl Scouts which encourage girls to attempt new things. |
| _____ 2. Buddy System | B. A way of gaining everyone's attention by raising your right hand with all five fingers extended in the air. Girls respond in similar manner until everyone has their right hand raised. |
| _____ 3. <i>STUDIO 2B</i> | C. A form of troop government used by Junior, Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts to make decisions. A moderator and a recorder conduct the meeting. |
| _____ 4. Girl Scout Motto | D. A celebration honoring the birthday of Lord Baden-Powell and Lady Baden-Powell. Girl Scouts and Girl Guides "think" about each other on this day. |
| _____ 5. Daisy Girl Scout | E. This term describes a GSUSA or international opportunity for girls 11—17 who submit an application to attend. |
| _____ 6. Girl-Adult Ratio | F. A grid system, wheel, or table showing the job assigned to each girl or group of girls for any given project. Useful for meetings, camp-outs, and special events. |
| _____ 7. Try-Its | G. The World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts. |
| _____ 8. Quiet Sign | H. A week-long celebration of the organization's history and girls' accomplishments. |
| _____ 9. Town Meeting | I. "Be prepared". Girl Scouts try to be ready to help where and when they are needed. |
| _____ 10. Court of Honor | J. Activities conducted by Brownie-Senior Girl Scouts to finance other activities they would like to do as part of their troop year. A service or product must be provided. |
| _____ 11. Bridging | K. Official awards for girls 11—17. |
| _____ 12. WAGGGS | L. An event which recognizes the accomplishment of girls and adults who have given service to the troop. Individuals are presented with GSUSA official awards. |
| _____ 13. Girl Scouts' Own | M. Begun by one person in a Friendship Circle, it stands for friendship with Girl Scouts everywhere. |
| _____ 14. Patrol | N. A leadership training and practicum for Senior Girl Scouts interested in working in day or resident camp. |
| _____ 15. Girl Scout Week | O. Official award earned by Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts requiring career exploration, skill development, service and exposure to technology. |
| _____ 16. Thinking Day | P. A group of girls no larger than eight, with a girl leader; usually a subdivision of a Girl Scout troop. |
| _____ 17. Friendship Squeeze | Q. The youngest of the five program age-levels. Girls must be at least five years old and in Kindergarten. |
| _____ 18. Interest Project | R. A safety practice of pairing girls to keep watch over each other while completing activities. |
| _____ 19. <i>destinations</i> | S. A program option for girls 11—17. |
| _____ 20. Court of Awards | T. The highest GSUSA award Junior Girl Scouts can earn. |
| _____ 21. Money-Earning Activities | U. A decision-making planning group composed of patrol leaders, troop leaders, secretary and treasurer with the responsibility of delegating kapers and coming up with ideas and suggestions for patrols to discuss and vote on. |
| _____ 22. CIT | V. A safety practice of having a specific number of adults for a given number of girls. |
| _____ 23. Charms | W. The process of learning about the next age-level. Begun during the last year a girl is at a given level. |
| _____ 24. Insurance | X. A reflective ceremony consisting of songs, poetry, readings, music or creative movement/artistry on a selected topic. |
| _____ 25. Bronze Award | Y. May be required for a 3- night camping trip. |
